With joy and bluntness, Annica Joensuu told readers about her thirst for knowledge and why the skin therapist profession is not getting the status it deserves.





Mintel calls on Europe to step up when it comes to anti-pollution beauty. Vivienne Rudd, Director of global Insight & Innovation, Beauty & Personal Care at Mintel said in a recent blog post that while antipollution is almost mainstream in regions like Asia and the US, in Europe, the market still lags behind. Despite growing awareness about the dangers of urban pollution among consumers, new product development (NPD) in Europe's beauty and personal care market is stagnating, Mintel finds. This situation may be linked to a lack of credibility of the benefits of anti-pollution in cosmetic products. "A third of German consumers say anti-pollution skincare products are of no use, and a quarter of French consumers don't believe anti-pollution haircare has any validity," points Mintel.

However, new data is now available, as testing agencies have worked on protocols that can evaluate antipollution protection. According to Vivienne Rudd, beauty brands now have valuable scientific tools to convince sceptical consumers.

Many years ago the Nordic skincare organisations had a close cooperation, but for some reason it ran into the sand. For two years the CIDESCO Section Sweden, SHR, took up this idea again, by inviting the other nordic countries to Stockholm for a meeting in connection with SHR's big exhibition Hud & Kosmetik. It was a success.

To the first meeting we invited schools and organisations from the nordic countries. Norway, Denmark, Iceland, Finland and Sweden. Many came to the first meeting and we had so much to discuss. We also invited the President of CIDESCO, Anna-Cari Gund, who held a presentation of the work of CIDESCO. At the meeting we agreed that we should continue and try to meet at least twice a year. At the next meeting in Denmark we formulated aims with the cooperation which are:

- 1. Get a higher recognition for our profession and organisations in the nordic countries
- 2. Exchange experiences
- 3. Together meet challenges and be a united nordic power-broker

The result of our work together so far is a marketing campaign with a nordic logo for each country and organisation. We will spread the logo in various ways and in different media. We have also a hashtag that we use **#nordicskintherapists.**

Our third meeting was held in connection with the CIDESCO Congress in Dublin due to the fact that we knew many from the nordic countries would be attending the Congress. At that meeting we decided that together we would try to modernise the way we analyse the skin and not emphasise the skin type so much but rather choose products and treatments which are more related to skin condition.

The latest meeting was held in Iceland in September. We were overjoyed to be invited by Iceland and the meeting was really successful since we now have contact with all organisations and there we really had time to get to know each other. The next meeting will be held in Norway next spring. Then we will compare and help each other with our rules for education.

The icelandic section prepared a wonderful programme for us with a study visit to the only school in Iceland, study visit to the factory which produces the Blue Lagoon products, a visit to the Blue Lagoon and other famous sights. We also passed the cultivation of the very innovative and popular brand, Bio Effect. The company was founded by three geneticists who spent ten years developing a method for creating biorisk-free recombinant proteins in plants for use in medical research. They founded BIOEFFECT when they discovered a way to bio-engineer a plant-based replica of EGF, a naturally occurring human protein, in barley.

There are also several other Icelandic interesting new brands such as; Gamla Apotekid, ZoPure, Una, EGF, Soley, Villmey, Taramar and many more.

A big thanks to the Icelandic CIDESCO Section for the wonderful visit in Iceland.

Between the meetings we have, we will visit each other on other occasions.

Needle-free Anti-Age treatments Part 2

Injections have become amongst the most popular Anti-Age- and Quick-Fixtreatments lately, but these treatments are exclusive, in most countries, for nurses and doctors to perform. Now we see a number of new innovative treatments for skin rejuvenation suited for the skin therapist. In the last issue of the CIDESCO LINK we wrote about infusion of active ingredients with Electroporation and Hydroporation. Now we will introduce you to new treatments for skin tightening using sound, light and mechanical devices to create a controlled thermal injury zone.

Plasma - Technology

A new cosmetic, non invasive treatment with plasmalight for skin tightening, has been developed by Pureneau in Germany. The treatment which is called Fibroblast is performed mainly in the eye area and the method effects only the epidermis unlike former methods. This method is safe for skin therapistst to work with.

Plasmalight

Plasma is according to physics a form of materia. If a gas is heated enough, the electrones will be separated from the nucleus of the atom and plasma is formed. Plasma can be described as a gas with electrical charged particles and is the most common shape of the visible matter in the universe. On the earth you can find plasma naturally in flashlights and flames and in technical devices such as plasma tv and strip lights. Plasma was discovered in 1879 by William Crookes and he called it radiant matter.

Treatments with Plasma

This is a brand new treatment for skin tightening with plasmaimpulses. The method uses a electrode which does not touch the skin. The electrode produces a tiny so called "Plasma-Flash" which jumps from the tip of the electrode to the skin and lets the surface of the skin evaporate. These millimetre size evaporations/spots will tighten the skin in the area. The skin will be stimulated by the pulses and there is only an effect where there is moisture in the skin. If there is no moisture there will be no effect. In this method vou will only be working in the tsratum cormeum of the epidermis.

Before treating the client you have to ask for contraindications, analyse the skin, give complete information of the treatment and advice for home care. The client needs to approve the treatment. Before the treatment you can also use an anesthetic.

Effects on the skin

There will be no form of current or heat on the skin. The electrode will not even be warm. After the treatment there will be dry, brown spots on the skin wich are dried out skin. These will disappear in five days. There will be no wounds or scarring since the barrier of the skin is not broken and due to that, you only work in the stratum cormeum. The treatment makes the dead skin cells disappear guicker and leaves a new skin layer. There will not be any pigmentation either.

Similar treatments

Similar effects can be reached with fractional CO2 laser but there you will work deeper down in the skin. Even though the laser is more invasive, the advantage is that it is more exact when it comes to the depth and the pattern of the theramal zone it creates. You can be more precise in the treatment, the collagen will contract immediately and the skin will be firmer.

MFU - Microfocused Ultrasound

Ultrasound is sound waves with frequencies higher than the upper audible limit of human hearing. Ultrasound is no different from 'normal' (audible) sound in its physical properties, except in that humans cannot hear it. This limit varies from person to person and is approximately 20 KHz (20,000 hertz) in healthy, young adults. Ultrasound devices operate with frequencies from 20 kHz up to several gigahertzes. Ultrasound is used in many different fields. Ultrasonic devices are used to detect objects and measure distances but are also used in medicine and physiotherapy and now in beauty therapy.

Effects of Microfocused Ultrasound

MFU is a non invasive treatment for skin tightening which creates small thermal injury zones. MFU generates heat deeper in the dermis and the cutaneous tissue, leading to new collagen synthesis and subsequent skin tightening and elevation. When collagen is exposed to 60-65 degrees Celsius, it becomes denatured. New collagen and elastin will be formed along with hyaluronic acid.





Microfocused Ultrasound uses sound waves to tighten and elevate skin through stimulating collagen synthesis.

How does it work?

When ultrasound are mikrofocused to a point in living tissue, molecular vibration results and heat is generated creating well-defined thermal injury zones at predetermined depths while leaving the surrounding tissue unaffected. MFY is different to RF energy in that it can be microfocused to target deeper tissue without affecting more superficial tissue. It can heat deeper tissue to 60-70 degrees Celsius without damaging the skin. You can work from 1.5mm deep to 5.5mm deep which targets the SMAS (superficial muscular aponeurotic system). The treatment can be painful so before the treatment you can also use an anesthetic. The result will not be seen before 3-6 months after the treatment.

Thermo-Mechanical Ablation treatment using heated pins to vaporise water in the skin.







TMA – Thermo-Mechanical Ablation

TMA is a new way of doing treatments for skinrejuvenation and wrinkles. TMA enables an exact, correct and painfree evaporation of the skin without creating any unwanted damage in the surrounding healthy tissue. The company behind the method is Tixel.

TMA treatment

The treatment is safe with a fast healing process. You can transfer heat energy to the skin fast and safe. The heat is generated from a mould with small pyramidal pins wich are made of biocompatible material and will cover an area of 1cm². The pins will be heated to 400 degrees Celcius, the same temperature created from a CO₂ laser when it hits the skin.

The pins have an exact time duration and hit in under a couple of milliseconds. The following vaporisation of the water in the skin will occur immediately and result in a formation of tiny craters in the treatment area. The small pins have the exact heat to create a controlled vaporisation without damaging the skin. This is often seen with, for instance, laser.

Collagen Beauty





Collagen is the most abundant structural protein in the connective tissue making up 75% of our skin. Adding connective tissue from fish or pigs or cows to your morning coffee, juice or smoothies is right on trend right now. Collagen is the latest "it" antiaging supplement and is everywhere from on-line stores, pharmacies or professional skincare clinics. Whats the buzz? What's the difference between them all and does it really work?

Collagen is the most abundant structural protein in the connective tissue making up 75% of our skin. Collagen supports the skin's cohesion, elasticity, density and strength, and is comprised of various amino acids which are, in simple terms, the building blocks of protein within the skin. Essential amino acids cannot be made by the body, and as a result they must be supplemented.

The most common amino acids are Glycine, Proline, Hydroxyproline and Arginine. These amino acids supply nutrients to nourish the skin, hair and nails and are essential to maintaining collagen at healthy levels.

Types of Collagen

- Type I the most predominate form of collagen in the skin representing about 80%; supports skin strength
- Type II supports cartilage strength
- Type III represents about 15% and maintains skin's elasticity and is essential in wound repair
- Type IV supports the extracellular matrix of the skin

There are over 16 types of collagen present in the body, but collagen type I – IV are the collagens that support skin as well as cartilage strength.

As we age, the amount of collagen in our skin begins to decrease leading to fine lines, wrinkles and loss of radiance. By the age of 50 we have lost almost 50% of the collagen in our skins. Both liquid and tablet forms of collagen supplements have been used for years, but unfortunately, most forms have shown little benefit due to the lack of absorption capability within the body. Reasons for this include the molecules being too large to absorb and degradation from stomach gastric juices.

Successful formulas use Hydrolyzed Collagen. Long chains of proteins are broken down into shorter pieces, resulting in short individual peptides which make up hydrolyzed collagen. Breaking peptides into sections is known as hydrolysis. These collagen peptides are absorbed quickly by the body and stimulate the body's own natural production of collagen.

Bioavailability is the prime criteria in evaluating any supplement, not just collagen, and is the amount of supplement actually absorbed at a cellular level. Studies have shown hydrolyzed collagen to be 90% bioavailable, whereas non-hydrolyzed collagen has only a 5% bioavailability. Vitamin C is vital to assist in collagen synthesis, so look for that in the formula.

Published studies in both the Journal of Cosmetic Dermatology and Skin Pharmacology and Physiology have shown that oral collagen peptide supplementation significantly increased skin hydration after 8 weeks of intake, and collagen density in the dermis significantly increased. Both effects persisted after 12 weeks.

Collagen supplements are safe to consume and the FDA has ensured that all supplements are manufactured in FDA approved laboratories. The safety profile of collagen is clearly backed by research. There does not appear to be an overdose risk since collagen is water-soluble and is quickly eliminated from the body. However, this means that it needs to be replenished regularly. Acne affects millions of people in the world and it is the most common of all skin diseases that attacks both adolescents and adults. Scientific research shows that nearly 80% of the world's population aged between 12 and 24 years suffers from some type of acne. Acne mostly appears on the face, but also can appear on the back, chest and upper arm.

What is acne?

Acne is a disorder in secretion of sebaceous glands in the skin.

Follicula

The follicula is the space where the hair develops. The place where the hair appears on the surface of the skin we call a pore. The sebaceous glands excrete their secretion in the follicula with the purpose of lubricating the surface of the skin. At the same time, dead cells of the upper layer of the skin (stratum disjunctum) peel and fall helping to lubricate the skin surface.

Sebum

Sebaceous glands are placed near the top of the follicula where they excrete sebum. Sebaceous glands look like two or three lobulus with hexagonal cells (like honeycomb). The sebaceous glands excrete their secretion in the follicula with the purpose of lubricating the surface of the skin.

The secretion of sebaceous glands is called sebum and sebum comes through the pores to the surface. The sebum is a mixture of fats, proteins, cholesterol, alcohol and salt. On the skin surface sebum forms a slightly acidy film which protects skin from bacteria and other infection. In the normal function of sebaceous glands they produce exactly the right amount of sebum to lubricate the surface of the skin and in that instance, skin is healthy with small pores.

How acne apears

However, when there is disorder in the secretion of the sebaceous glands and they start to over excrete, the sebum fills the follicula and plugs the pores which causes further blockages to the surface of the skin. The sebum starts to putrify which helps to develop bacteria.

A pimple occurs when the damaged follicle weakens and bursts open releasing sebum, bacteria, skin and white blood cells into the surrounding tissues. Inflamed pimples near the skin's surface are papules and deeper ones are pustules. The most severe type of acne consists of cysts (closed sacs) and nodules (hard swellings).

Moderate and severe inflammatory types of acne result when the plugged follicle is invaded by Propionibacterium acnes, anaerobic bacteria. This bacterium is most often located in the skin. Infections caused by anaerobic bacteria are marked by bad-smelling pus, the formation of abscesses and the destruction of tissue.

Types of acne

There are various types of acne and they are differentiated by size and inflammatory or non-inflammatory lesions:

- Blackheads or Whiteheads
- Acne juveniles, papullo pustular acne, Common acne
- Acne vulgaris
- Acne Indurate (bacterial infection)
- Nodular Acne (hard swellings) bacterial infection
- Acne Cysts (closed sacs) bacterial infection
- Acne Conglobate bacterial infection
- Acne Rosacea

Acne treatments

Classic treatment for most types of infected acnes consist of reducing sebum production, removing dead skin cells and killing bacteria with topical drugs or by using antibiotics, chemical peels or Accutane for difficult types of acnes.

One of the new approaches in acne treatment is ozone therapy which works by detoxifying the skin. It deep cleanses the skin and boosts up the oxygen levels in the skin.

One of the variants for external application of ozone is Hydro-ozone therapy that can be used both in dermatological clinics and beauty salons too. Baths with ozonized mineralized water are used to increase peripheral blood circulation and improve the diffusion processes in the skin so that tissues will receive not only oxygen and ozone, but also mineral substances like zinc and silicon.

Considering that the most common bacteria affected acnes are anaerobic bacteria - they are bacteria that do not need oxygen present - proliferation ozone therapy can be used as a therapy of choice in the acne treatment. Ozone destroys both aerobic, and more importantly, anaerobic bacteria which are mostly responsible for the acne's complicated infections

The mechanisms of ozone bacterial destruction can be explained through the well known fact that the cell coating of bacteria is made of polysaccharides and proteins, and that in Gram negative organisms, fatty acid alkyl chains and helical lipoproteins are present.

Cosmetics procedures:

- cleansing gel and tonic to remove make-up and atmosphere pollution
- cleaning with ozonized water to remove residue of milk and tonic to emulsify pollution
- cosmetics cleanser to remove some deeper pollution and some over excreted sebum; cleaning with ozonized water
- peeling to remove thick keratin layer of dead cells; cleaning with ozonized water - only if there is no open affected areas
- skin oxygenized for a few minutes with oxygen machine (not necessary)
- adsorbing anti-acne mask for 15 minutes
- wash with lukewarm ozonized water
- application of Anti-acne ampoule or serum
- recommended ozonized non-fat cream or solution for home use

Preparing ozonized water:

60ug/ml (4.5%) medical ozone distribute for 5 min in 1 litre of lukewarm water in which is dissolved 1/2 table spoon of Marine salt consisting trace minerals with alginate. Ozone will not stay in demineralized water for very long, even at 4°C degrees. In the mineralized water the ozone hangs onto the minerals without oxidizing them and remains available over many months.

Alternatively, you can put common water in the storage of the application gun in the machine for delivering ozonized water fine dispersions and apply ozonized water onto skin directly. The pressure will help the ozone enter into the deep layer of the skin.



Sound

It is obvious to anyone who listens to music that sound plays an important part in our emotional lives. All sounds have a profound effect on our emotions, psyche and well-being. What is less widely known is how music works to make us feel happy, tranquil, energised or even to facilitate healing.

Sound Waves/Frequencies

Most researchers into sound therapy agree that sound waves or frequencies are responsible for music's ability to influence us and many believe that they may have therapeutic benefits that go far beyond the ability to alter our moods, believing the right frequencies used in the right combinations may be able to bring about biological changes that can help boost our immune system and even heal the body. Sound waves have a direct effect on the nervous system and it has been shown to alter brainwaves, leading to deep mental and physical relaxation.

Sound Resonance

Resonance happens when a strong vibration causes something else to vibrate. This strong vibration can be in tune with nature - or not. Resonance is the key to using sound to make changes in your life and it is completely based on science. Science has even explained resonance at the quantum level, which is now beginning to explain our connections to each other as spiritual beings and how intention works.

Sound Vibration

Everything vibrates. What we experience as sound is the vibration of air molecules at different speeds starting a pattern of vibrations in the ear drum that a complicated system of receiving mechanisms repeat to different nerve endings and send as patterns to the brain. A cell is the basic element of the human body and research has proven that the easiest and most effective way to communicate with the cells is through "vibration". When an external vibration is produced, a sympathetic resonance in the cells starts off the stimulation process.
