

We wish them a warm welcome and are confident that these Organisations will represent CIDESCO's interests in their country and help to grow the prestigious name of the CIDESCO brand in their countries.

- · Furthermore, new guidelines for Beauty and Spa Salons accreditation were ratified allowing the accreditation procedure to be open for more quality Salons. Encouraging well run Salons and Spas to be part of the CIDESCO group.
- · Association of Beauty Therapy & Cosmetology CIDESCO Section India has been entrusted with the privilege of hosting the CIDESCO World Congress & Exhibition in September 2017, in Mumbai. More information will be available on our website.

At the CIDESCO Public Relations meeting a new Committee was formed. The Committee will continually promote CIDESCO as the world leader in Beauty and Spa Therapy and the foremost qualification in Education.

Shining Skills of India



Skill India, celebrated its anniversary in New Delhi where over 50,000 visitors witnessed the India Skill Competition 2016. India Skills, an initiative of the National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) under the Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship celebrated the World Youth Skills Day on 15th July, 2016 by kick starting the India Skill Competition at Pragati Maidan, New Delhi.

The competition witnessed 4,820 candidates competing in 24 skills culminated from 80 regional rounds. India Skill competition is the gateway to the WorldSkills International Competition. The next WorldSkills International Competition will be staged in Abu Dhabi in 2017 and India is strongly preparing to represent its skill strength in WorldSkills, 2017.

Amongst all skills progressing effectively, Beauty Therapy has been a shining skill as India has grabbed 'Medallion of Excellence' in last consecutive years of WorldSkills competition, 2015 held at Sao Paulo, Brazil and in 2013 held at Leipzig, Germany. Beauty Therapy also features in the top 3 skill categories for NSDC as it empowers women segment at large along with the high component of job creation through entrepreneurship. The consecutive India representative in Beauty Therapy in WorldSkills Competition in 2013 and 2015, Ms. Rarveena Bhatti and Ms. Neha Chande were trained by LTA School of Beauty. LTA School of Beauty reinforced its excellence in training and education in beauty therapy at India Skill Competition, 2016, Pragati Madian too as two of its candidates qualified for the next round of competing for participation in WorldSkills, 2017 at Abu Dhabi. Under the aegis of Beauty & Wellness Sector Skill Council, the 10 winners of India Skill Competition and regional rounds of beauty therapy shall compete again

in September in elimination round. The elimination round shall finalise three winners in beauty therapy who will further compete again in March '17 and the final winner shall represent India at Abu Dhabi.



INTERVIEW WITH

Sandy Fuhr, founder of Beauty Therapy Institute

How does it feel for you, the founder of BTI, to reach this significant milestone?

It feels amazing. As if a miracle and dream has come true for me. To be in a position to give someone a future is like giving a life. My lifetime dream has been to give others the same opportunities I have had. And the other has been to take our South African educational standards to Africa. I am seeing my dreams come true. Not an overnight success, but certainly one that has come along slowly but surely and impacted thousands of people.

On what date in June 1996 did you open the first school?

1 June 1996 in Cape Town.

When did you open the second BTI school and where is it situated?

Randburg, Johannesburg in 2008.

What would you say is the secret to the school's success?

Total dedication to maintain a continuously high standard of education, ensuring our learners leave us well trained and skilled, with a career potential ahead of them. We have a unique system of modular training whereby a candidate can choose one or many modules to study, in their own time, at their own pace. Small classes ensure dedicated attention from our highly qualified and experienced educators. We also guarantee interviews within the Sorbet group of salons.

How has the industry changed since you first opened BTI?

In a huge way. This is now one of the largest growing industries globally. When I qualified and then started BTI quite a few years later, the beauty industry was fledgling. The Health and Skincare training standards were already extremely high in South Africa, which started the trend of ensuring that South African therapists become the best trained therapists worldwide. A legacy which continues. I believe the input of SAAHSP at that time ensured that all training centres and educators were uplifted to a point where they were able to give students the best education possible. There were fewer Beauty salons, but they were beginning to show some form of sustainability. Those that were out there were fragmented and focussed on the guiet, feminine, tranguil and pretty treatments. All treatments were behind closed doors. Not a very attractive environment to the male clientele. Spas were non-existent and neither was there a market for the medical-aesthetics which is hugely popular nowadays. Basic training was all that was being taught, mostly in a full time, two year basis.

Which of the nine BTI schools is the biggest?

Cape Town campus. Rivonia campus is hot on its heels in terms of number of candidates enrolling.

Do you have an exact number of BTI graduates to date?

Thousands due to the modular system.

Do you keep in touch with BTI graduates once they have left the school?

Social media keeps us connected with our learners through all of the campuses. Our Alumni of past students also enable us to send newsletters and information of what is happening at BTI and in the industry.

Apart from the special agreement with Sorbet, is BTI involved in placing graduates in the workplace or arranging job interviews in any way, especially for top-achieving graduates?

Many of our colleges have Beauty Salons connected to them - some of the Franchisees have their own Beauty or Medical Aesthetic salons. This enables students and graduates to work in those placement zones. We also have relationships with various Spas and Medical Aesthetic salons which assist us with training in their facilities, from where they attract our graduates.

What is the maximum number of students per class?

10 students to one educator for practical. If there are more, we place two educators in the class. Our primary focus is on modular training, which enables this scenario. In our full time Service SETA funded Learnership course, we had 20 learners per class, with 10 working at a time on each other. We are currently running a program with Glencore in Secunda where they send 14 young ladies to training with us, with two of our educators in attendance.

Apart from having offered new students a 20% discount, are you planning any celebratory events for the staff?

We held a two day franchise forum for all of our franchisees and educators in April, covering administrative as well as training technique forums. They all flew to JHB and stayed in a hotel to be together. In the evening, we took them to the Lion Park to celebrate. On the second day we celebrated with a BTI 20th birthday cake and flowers.

Vietnam 2016 Pilgrimage

CIDESCO Examiner, Corrine Brown, an holistic healer, trainer, counsellor and founder of the Institute of Holistic Therapies in Australia, takes a yearly pilgrimage. This year she travelled to Vietnam and shares with us her experiences, love and joy of this beautiful country.

Our first port of call in Vietnam was its capital city, Hanoi (since the reunification of North and South Vietnam in 1975). We focussed only on North and Central Vietnam.

Vietnam was part of Imperial China for over a thousand years before an independent Vietnamese state was formed following a Vietnamese victory in the Battle of Bach Đang River. Successive Vietnamese royal dynasties flourished as the nation expanded geographically and politically into Southeast Asia, until the Indochina Peninsula was colonised by the French. Following a Japanese occupation in the 1940s, the Vietnamese fought French rule in the First Indochina War, eventually expelling the French in 1954. Vietnam was then divided politically into two rival states, North and South Vietnam. Conflict between the two states intensified in what is known as the Vietnam War. The war ended with a North Vietnamese victory in 1975.

Vietnam was then unified under a communist government but remained impoverished and politically isolated. In 1986, the government initiated a series of economic and political reforms which began Vietnam's path towards integration into the world economy.

Vietnam is one of five socialist states. A developing country from third world to second world, Vietnam has many intriguing facets to her - the chaos, the natural beauty, the land, the sea, the rivers, the mountains etc.

We headed to the country and mountains to be with the tribes in Sa Pa or Sapa (elevation of 1500 metres) where most of the ethnic minority groups such as Hmong, Dao (Yao), Giáy, Pho Lu, and Tay live and work their land on sloping rice and corn terraces. The climate is cool, rainy and foggy when we visited end June. We made our way to Mt Fansipan, the highest in Indochina (comprising Vietnam, Laos, and Cambodia), at 3,143 metres above sea level - dubbed "the Roof of Indochina".

Our personal donations of notepads, pencils, sharpeners, erasers, rulers, stencils, stamps, toys, teddies, lipsticks, bags, clothes, paints, colouring items etc were very popular. We visited schools, day care centres, strolling the streets and through the villages.

The smiles on the faces and the joy of receiving came to some as a shock or surprise. Some hesitated, even returning the gifts until it was mentioned that it is free. Some just kept coming back for more whilst others just shied away, leaving their parents to receive them on their behalf.

After leaving the mountains, we headed towards the waters to beautiful Halong Bay where its natural beauty is tainted with pollution unfortunately but nonetheless still magnificent. Donations here were given to the crew that helped make our journey memorable.

Heading to Central Vietnam, Hue, Danang via the 21 km long mountain Hai Van pass and Hoi An was quite a contrast to the mountainous Sa Pa and majestic Halong Bay. This mountain pass once formed the boundary between the kingdoms of Dai Viet and Champa as well as the boundary between the climates of northern and southern Vietnam.

Along our way to Hue, Da Nang and Hoi An, our donations continued with the locals on the streets and small villages. Cycling around Hoi An through the rice fields (flat not terraced in contrast to Sa Pa) and vegetable farms in the rain, was an experience not to be forgotten. The rain was welcoming due to the high humidity and heat experienced this time of the year. Once again, the children in the villages were pleased to accept our gifts in exchange for a smile and a simple thank you in English or Cam On in Vietnamese.

Enjoy the blessings that life presents, for they may be taken away so suddenly. During moments of despair, remember we are never alone as there are many that are in similar or more unfortunate circumstances and we share the same pain.

A new CIDESCO Section Serbia was accepted into the fold, led by Dr Vera Zec (pictured left), founder of Aquatonale Beauty Academy and an expert in the field of cosmetics along with cosmetologist Marta Kadas. Spotlight on... Ireland

CIDESCO has had a long history in Ireland having been first accepted as an official section in 1978.

The work that was carried out by those original pioneering women was quite extraordinary and a real debt of gratitude is owed to Bronwyn Conroy, Kay Galligan & Anne Weekes for all that they achieved in making CIDESCO the most sought after and prestigious qualification in the field of Beauty & Spa Therapy in Ireland - a position it still holds today.

Over the years the number of schools grew and today there are 26 but sadly, for a variety of reasons, the original Section did not survive. This created a real void and for a number of years each school operated as 'Affiliate' members rather than as a group.

There is always more strength in numbers and Ireland was in need of a new Section but the first challenge was to bring all the schools together again. This may sound simple but in fact it was extremely difficult and Zurich had made many attempts to reunite this fractured community, to no avail.

In 2012 CIDESCO International were trying to find suitable candidates to reform a Section. Mary & I had had business dealings over the years in another context and we had similar aspirations for the industry both in the short and the long term. In February 2013 we invited every school to attend a meeting where we could begin the process of forming a Section and of joining together in order to create a vision or a roadmap for the future, whereby we can re-energise our industry and endeavour to implement very important strategies in relation to official recognition of the CIDESCO qualification at a government level.

One of the biggest challenges at that time was to convince people that we could succeed at forming a new Section and that we would also be able to rebuild it into a thriving organisation, such as it had been back in the 1980's & 1990's. There was also the slight issue of finance as we had no possibility for funding and needed to support ourselves. This seemed like the most difficult task but in fact when people really understood that we were going to do this, each school contributed equally to the setting up of the organisation.

When the opportunity to host the 2016 CIDESCO World Congress arose Mary and I saw it as a wonderful opportunity to bring CIDESCO back onto the centre stage in Ireland and create an immediate awareness of the existence of the Section and the potential this would then give us to grow our membership numbers. Many people felt it was too early for us as an organisation and this was much debated however it was finally agreed

that we would proceed. It was an enormous challenge but we are happy to say that it has been a truly great success in every aspect and it has paved the way for us to proceed with our plans to grow as a group and to embark on a process which hopefully will lead to the recognition of the CIDESCO diploma by our Department of Education, which we believe is essential to the future viability of our schools and of standards in our industry.

Our biggest challenge in the future will be to keep CIDESCO 'Relevant' to the growing changes in our industry and to always endeavour to remain ahead in terms of training in a market that has become so fragmented by various training options that very often promise much and deliver little. To keep a constant awareness of the importance of the solid foundation CIDESCO affords its graduates and that we educate people about the benefits of our training and attract more people into our industry. We need to develop a programme of Continuous Professional Development (CPD) that is relevant to our industry and attracts new members and is a source of industry networking as well as being of educational benefit.

Whatever we do as a Section moving forward we are committed to working as a group for the betterment of our industry. We believe that this is extremely important to any Section and it was the principal upon which the Irish Section was originally founded and by which it thrived. When this principal was lost so too was the momentum and now we are able once again to move forward with renewed optimism and the belief that we can once again make our Section great.



India's love of Beauty

Ninety-one per cent of Indian households spend on barbers and beauty parlours reveals the first-ever focussed study on family spends in both urban and rural areas by the National Sample Survey Organisation (NSSO).

Unsurprisingly spending on mobile phones and on daily transport is widespread although beauty spend is still greater than transport. The study also revealed that the average household spend per month was \$8US in urban areas and \$3US in rural areas.

Sleep Can Cause Wrinkles



People who repeatedly sleep on their stomach or side are causing additional facial wrinkles to develop over time, says a new report by the Aesthetic Surgery Journal. Dr Goesel Anson, a plastic surgeon from the US describes "sleep wrinkles form in response to distortion created when the face is pressed against any sleep surface, they tend to worsen over time due to repetition combined with thinning of the skin and decreased elasticity as we age.

"One way to minimise sleep wrinkles is to limit facial distortion during sleep. If you can stay on your back, that's ideal. There are several speciality pillows available to help you achieve that."



20%

increase in cosmetic surgeries

The 2016 Aesthetics Market Report reveals a 20% increase in cosmetic surgeries in 2015 from the previous year, with the most popular of these surgeries being breast augmentation and abdominoplasty with a 10.4% and 11.1% increase respectively. In 2016, Breast Augmentation is still the most popular of procedure with 1,488,992 operations being performed last year and the figure is expected to rise this year.

The US sits at the top of the cosmetic surgery board, with 1.4 million surgical operations and 2.5 million non-surgical operations. Brazil came in second with 1.2 million surgical operations compared to 1.1 million non-surgical, followed by South Korea, India, Mexico, Germany and France.

Women made up 18 million of the statistics and 85.6% of total procedures with the most popular treatments being breast augmentation, liposuction, eyelid surgery, abdominoplasty and rhinoplasty.

Men only made up 14.4% of total operations, with eyelid surgery being most popular, followed by liposuction, gynecomastia surgery, rhinoplasty, fat grafting and ear surgery.

50 years of Congress memories

INTERVIEW WITH KATE WACZ

This year's World Congress was not only a special anniversary for CIDESCO; it was also a momentous occasion for one of our most esteemed members, Kate Wacz from Sweden. Kate celebrated attendance at her 50th CIDESCO World Congress and was as busy as ever attending meetings and the Exhibition as well as meeting up with old friends and judging the annual Make-up and Body Art competition for which there is the Kate Wacz prize.

With 50 years of CIDESCO Congress memories, we asked Kate to share some of her experiences, advice and special moments with us.

And how to avoid them

1. SAMENESS IS A DISEASE - DON'T COPY!

Too many first-time business owners copy existing business models.

Successful entrepreneurs realise from the outset that they need to differentiate themselves from the rest of the market. Even if you are in an industry that has many similar businesses, you should do whatever you can to set yourself apart from the crowd. Whether it's in the quality of your product, the quality of your service or the way in which you market your brand, always try to be ahead of the game. The lead sled-dog in the pack always has the best view!

2. CASH IS KING - BUDGET PROPERLY

The large majority of new businesses fail because they are under capitalised. Owners invariably underestimate the funds required to see them through the first year or two. Very few start-ups are successful right from the beginning. It takes time to establish a business model and to build a brand. Before you even start, you need to carefully budget your cash flow requirements so you don't run out of funds before you are able to stand on your own two feet.

3. DON'T MILK THE BUSINESS - GIVE IT A REAL CHANCE OVER THE LONG TERM

I have seen several entrepreneurs drawing big salaries for themselves and buying fancy cars long before their businesses can afford such luxuries. Somehow, they believe that running their own businesses should entitle them to become rich as quickly as possible. The only thing that happens quickly in these cases is failure!

Starting and building a business is a long-term proposition. You should be comfortable that you are in this for the long haul. When I started Sorbet, I set myself a goal to establish a strong brand in no less than 15 years! It takes courage and determination to get through the difficult early stages.

4. DON'T FOCUS ONLY ON MAKING MONEY BUILD A CULTURE OF PEOPLE AND SERVICE


New business owners often tend to believe that their employees are merely tools to help them make money and so they treat them without respect. This is a huge mistake.

You will never make money if you don't build a culture in your business that is centred around people and service. The purpose of work is not to make money. It is to serve the needs and wants of people. Only when you have served... and served well, will you deserve to make money. So you need to create a working environment in which your employees are happy and content and in which they are motivated to serve people.

5. DON'T TAKE SHORT CUTS – ALWAYS SHOW INTEGRITY IN YOUR LEADERSHIP

Dishonesty is a killer in business. Your reputation and credibility as a business owner depend largely on the manner in which you conduct yourself. If your employees see you taking chances or breaking the law, they will have no problem in doing that themselves.

Never make a promise you cannot keep and always be open and transparent in your leadership style. Remember, that you are there to support your staff... not the other way around and always pay your staff on time... no matter what the situation.


